9. Criteria for admission to the programme
<p>We welcome a diverse student cohort to support diverse and inclusive creative practice. Applicants usually achieve 112 UCAS points or a relevant equivalent qualification. Please see https://www.ucas.com/ucas/tariff-calculator to help you calculate your tariff points. After completing the UCAS process, applicants may be required to submit a portfolio of their work to support their application. Additionally, in certain cases, applicants might be invited for an interview. Further instructions will be provided after submitting the application.</p> <p>The Arts and Creative Industries Foundation Year at Middlesex University is available for those applicants with no or very limited practical experience, before progressing onto year 1 of the BA Film programme.</p>

Overseas applicants must possess an IELTS 6.0 qualification in each category. Those who do not meet this English language proficiency level are strongly advised to enrol in the Pre-sessional English course and Foundation Year programme to adequately prepare for the full degree course.

There are no restrictions to admission to the programme based on disability. Students with disabilities will receive support to fully participate in the programme (refer to section 16 for details).

Direct entry to Year 2 or Year 3 of the programme is evaluated on an individual basis. While Year 3 entry is seldom suitable, applications for it will be reviewed by the programme team. Any applications for entry with prior accreditation or advanced standing will undergo assessment following the University's standard procedures.

We welcome applicants from Foundation, HND, or BTEC courses. We also welcome applicants with relevant experience from industry, as well as those without evidenced work experience or formal qualifications, as long as they demonstrate an aptitude for learning and a commitment to photography.

If an applicant has substantial work experience, specialist expertise or previous awards/qualifications, it is possible to have this experience recognised and claim university credit through the Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) process.

10. Aims of the programme

The programme aims to:

- Support students in becoming highly skilled photographic practitioners, able to work with informed choice and control across a range of photographic processes.
- Create a collaborative, supportive environment in which ideas and learning can thrive and be purposefully developed, in fulfilment of students' creative and professional potential.
- Foster critical enquiry across aesthetic, ethical, political, cultural and social considerations, to enable students to be reflective, confident and responsible in their creative output.
- Promote social responsibility and an ethical orientation, in recognition of photography's potential and capacity for positive social change.
- Equip students with the knowledge, skills, experience, and resilience required to establish a sustainable practice and career in the field of photography, the wider creative industries and post-graduate education.
- Produce well-rounded, articulate and visually literate graduates, who are technologically and intellectually agile, able to work both independently and in collaboration with others.

14. Placement opportunities, requirements and support (if applicable)
<p>Placement opportunities are available as part of modules PHO2130 Professional Alignment and PHO3130 Professional Toolkit. Students can incorporate work experience into their second or third-year assessment. This can be in the form of instigating an internship opportunity, either independently or engaging with MDXWorks to do so. Students could also establish a mentorship, or engage in the form of correspondence with an industry professional or alumni.</p> <p>The building of a 'professional toolkit' serves as a personal journal documenting templated activities and tasks related to employability.</p>

15. Future careers / progression

Employability is integrated throughout the programme, designed around the progressive development of knowledge, skills and experience of creative, professional practice, tailored across students' fields of choice. Developmental modules offer the opportunity to develop skills in collaborating with others, research, project management, pitching, presentation and writing across different platforms. Students gain wide experience in producing a range of public-facing outcomes, in directing their own projects with strategies for their appropriate dissemination. Students are supported in establishing a clear sense and direction for their own sustained, independent practice, post-graduation, including preparing them for pursuing opportunities for publication, commissioned work, post-graduate study and/or a wide-range of future career paths in the creative industries. Recent graduates have gone on to be employed in positions including: studio assistant; photo editor; editorial portraiture; fashion photographer; working artist; studio manager; stylist; photography writer; curator; gallery assistant; photo lab technician; re-toucher; e-commerce photographer and architectural photographer.

16. Particular support for learning (if applicable)

An academic adviser to help manage the journey through higher education and provide regular sessions along with information and support at any point in the academic year.

Outstanding technical facilities include four Photographic Studios, the Digital Darkroom (80 workstations, Hasselblad Flextight scanners, L8 A2 plus 6 large format Epson printers all colour-managed), two Black and White Darkrooms (up to 5x4 large format), Colour C-type darkroom (up to 5x4 large format) and (Colorama backdrops, full height cove, electronic flash and tungsten lighting).

A range of workshops, facilities and expert technical staff provide the technical input for the realization of any studio-based materials required for the research projects.

Loan store with an extensive range of equipment: film cameras from 35mm through medium format (645, 67) to large format (5x4), full frame digital cameras with a wide range of lenses, flashguns, location lighting kits, light modifiers etc. This is a free service.

Library facilities and resources, including specialist books, journals, videos, DVDs, slides, special collections, and computer programmes. There is a fine collection of Photography books, journals and videos/DVDs of recorded programmes on the work of Photographers.

The **Learning Enhancement Team** and the **Subject Librarian** in the Sheppard Library support students with different aspects of academic study and research to develop essential skills in these areas.

Students are also given 24/7 access to **MyLearning**, a robust online learning support platform containing a raft of communication and assessment tools, and supported by an accessible learning technology unit within the University's **Centre for Academic Practice Enhancement**. This ensures students can access the latest learning technologies and platforms, to support and advance academic practice, teaching and

assessment.
